A Message from the CEO

The fiscal year May 1, 2019 to April 30, 2020 was proceeding according to plan until the COVID-19 struck in March which caused drastic change. On Monday March 16, 2020 the Sail Canada office closed and all the staff started working from home. The office remains closed; accordingly. We appreciate your patience and support during these difficult times.

In spite of the recent challenges faced by COVID-19 Sail Canada's staff and volunteers can be proud of the accomplishments achieved over the past fiscal year. During the course of the year, Sail Canada focused on delivering quality programs in all areas and providing increased support to the Canadian Sailing Team, Development Squad and the Youth Squad athletes. The Performance Hubs in British Columbia, Ontario and Nova Scotia continue to be a focus of new investment by Sail Canada for the Next Generation of competitive sailors. This ongoing investment in our young athletes will pay dividends in years to come.

Trailing back to March, some team coaches and members had just arrived in Spain to compete at the Princess Sophia as one of the last events of the Olympic trials. The event was cancelled, and team members and coaches had to return home. With the Olympics postponed, all the lead up momentum and planned activities to promote and send off the Canadian Olympic Sailing Team in the summer of 2020 was put on hold. This was very difficult for all involved, especially the athletes who had put in so much time to train and prepare for the Olympics and represent Canada.

Sail Canada continues to invest in our high-performance athletes as funding from Sport Canada, the Canadian Olympic Committee and Own the Podium approximately 50% of the revenues is dedicated to high performance Olympic Disciplines and has to be used for the purposes of preparing athletes for the Olympics. The accomplishments and highlights are noted in this Annual Report. Please take a moment to review them and appreciate the work that has been accomplished by the staff and volunteers on behalf of the sailing community.

With the onset of COVID-19, and the closing or delayed opening of clubs, Sail Canada established a "Sail Canada Health and Return to Sailing Task Force" to help Sail Canada provide advice to our clubs as we navigated through the pandemic. With the expertise of medical and scientific members of the Task Force, Sail Canada, in collaboration with our provincial partners, was able to produce a number of documents to help the community return to participating in the sport. These documents can be found here on our website, <u>https://www.sailing.ca/covid-19-updates/</u>.

Documents included a general "Return to Sailing" document with all the safety measures and protocols required for a safe return to the water. From this base document other documents such as "Return to Training", "Return to Programming", "Return to Cruising" and "Return to Competition" were produced. All of these documents provided the latest in safety measures and protocols to keep our members safe.

To be noted, the office remains closed as the COVID-19 pandemic continues, however, when necessary a staff member will go to the office to carry out functions that can only be done from the office such as filling orders, etc. If more than one staff member is present at the same time, they practice physical distancing and will continue to serve the membership as a priority.

The current year in progress

Due to COVID-19, Sail Canada had anticipated that revenues in the area of club membership, instructor registration and program participation would be drastically reduced. This was estimated to be in the range of \$700,000. As the sailing season comes to a close in most parts of the country, we now anticipate the revenue shortfall to be in the range of \$500,000 which is one fifth of our regular budget. As a result, Sail Canada had to cut back on its programming expenses for the year and any other expenses that could be delayed until events return to normal. Sail Canada was fortunate to have received COVID-19 relief funding from Sport Canada to help offset some regular ongoing expenses such as staffing. Virtually all travel has been on hold and this year will be the first year that we will hold the Annual General Meeting virtually including the voting of directors to the Board of Directors. Although holding virtual meetings was in the longer-term plan, COVID-19 required Sail Canada to implement the virtual meetings immediately. Going forward we will continue to do so and invite our club members to join the annual meetings and provide input and feedback on our progress.


I would also like to thank the ongoing support Sail Canada receives from the Government of Canada and the Canadian Olympic Committee. In addition and big thank you to our national sponsors - Rolex Canada, Gallagher Skippers' Plan, Helly Hansen Canada, North Country Marine with Mercury Marine Canada and BMO MasterCard

Sail Canada, working with our provincial partners is seeking member input into the development of a Strategic Plan. Part of this plan will be to develop strategies to help Clubs recover for the COVID-19 pandemic. This strategy will also be to promote the sport of sailing to the broader Canadian public and to be inclusive and welcoming for the entire Canadian population including the increase in female participation and promoting sailing to underrepresented groups.

As a member-based organization Sail Canada is committed to ensuring that we continue to strengthen and improve our national programs to be delivered through our provincial partners and ultimately at the club level.

We will be launching a revised CANSail Program and working to ensure our Clubs meet the international standards of excellence through a club certification program. We will continue to develop athlete programs that will lead to international successes. We hope to see the Olympics take place in 2021 with appropriate safety protocols where our sailing athletes can showcase their talent. To our clubs, their committees and managements, we are very grateful for your commitment to sailing in Canada and for ensuring a warm welcome for all of new members and sailors.

GOVERNANCE & OPERATIONS

The organization is governed by a nine-member Board of Directors. The Chair and six Directors-at-Large are elected by the membership, consisting of Provincial Sailing Associations (PSA), class associations and sailing clubs across Canada. Two Athlete Directors are elected by carded athletes. Sail Canada's by-laws mandate diversity, requiring board members and athlete directors of different genders.

Sail Canada has a clear organizational structure with specific roles and responsibilities of staff and volunteers creating a clear distinction between governance by the Board of Directors and operations delivered by the CEO and staff, supported by advisory committees. The Board of Directors governs the organization and provides strategic direction, financial oversight and the policy framework and then delegates the responsibility for operation to the CEO who works with the staff and content experts to accomplish the Strategic Objectives of the organization.





SAIL CANADA GROUPS & COMMITTEES

The Sail Canada Board of Directors may constitute Program and Adhoc Committees as it deems necessary in carrying out the affairs of the Association and define their terms of reference in a Policy on Organizational Structure.

The Provincial Council is a standing advisory committee of the Board of Directors. The Provincial Council will consist of presidents of each provincial/territorial sailing association or their nominees, and will be responsible for alerting and advising the Board on national issues or concerns that could affect the long-term success of Sail Canada/Voile Canada as the national authority for sport of sailing in all its forms in Canada, including yachting.




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
High-performance team had an active year focussed on the following planned initiatives;

A. Qualifying for the Tokyo 2020 Olympics -Canada qualified in the following classes; 49er, 49erFX, Laser Radial, Finn, 470 Men, RS:X Women

B. Olympic Plan- With the postponement of the Tokyo 2020 Olympics until July 2021 the entire performance support team has been working on a revised Olympic plan. Of significance is the revised athlete and coach scheduling, and boat transportation plan.

C. 2019/2020 was an unusual year in that there we saw most classes running two World Championships in the southern hemisphere (NZL & AUS) within one fiscal year which contributed to unexpected expenses which put us over budget in this area.





D. The Canadian Sailing Youth Squad Initiative- New for 2020 was the establishment of a Canadian Sailing Youth Squad. The purpose of this Team is to provide enhanced training opportunities for identified sailors through the regional hubs and Regional Talent ID Camps.

E. Coach Development- As part of our strategic plan to produce world class coaches Sail Canada held a professional coaches clinic in October 2019 and continues working on coaching tools such as the video library. We also introduced various webinars for both athletes and coaches to enhance skill and improvements.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2019 Sail Canada Regional Championships engaged developing sailors across the country in both training and racing activity. Thanks to Shediac Bay Yacht Club, Hudson Yacht Club and Central Okanagan Sailing Club for hosting. Sail Canada Youth and Senior National Championships took place at CORK International and OCR respectively, providing great sailing conditions for all 500 racers.



CANSAIL

A review of the CANSail program began at the club and grassroots level in summer 2019. We were able to meet with numerous club managers, coaches, learning facilitators and instructors at their sailing clubs to have a meaningful discussion on the changes and updates that they would like to see in the CANSail Program.



A number of presentations were completed at clubs when feasible to do so in person. Surveys were also used to solicit input. Having these discussions in person with the people who are running the CANSail programs provided a strong foundation for the review process.

Work to adjust the CANSail skill checklists began following the annual meetings and was carried out through the winter, with a group of technical experts from across Canada. This work and piloting of the revisions will be carried out through 2020. A three-year CANSail program improvement plan has been developed to review student, instructor and evaluator pathways. Included in this plan, teaching and learning resources have been identified to compliment the CANSail updates.

The CANSail program was granted World Sailing Accreditation in 2019, following a review of the program structure, materials and delivery model. This accreditation recognizes the CANSail program at an international level.

CRUISING, KEEL, POWER & NAVIGATION

Translation of standards and exams was a primary focus in the Cruising, Power and Navigation area. Bringing French and English documents in line with one another. A great deal of volunteer effort was directed toward developing rubrics to support the Start Keelboat Sailing and Basic Cruising standards, as well as screencasts to support Instructor training.



OFFICIALS

Sail Canada collaborated with US Sailing to give Sail Canada Officials access to US Sailing SOARS. The SOARS system provides officials with a platform to record and track events they are part of on an annual basis. It helps to streamline information collected about each event and provides an easy option for officials who need to provide this information when it comes time for certification and recertification. Sail Canada Officials have been requesting access to this system for a number of years and we are pleased to be able to offer access. There were some lessons learned in the first year of providing access to SOARS. We hope to streamline the process of accessing SOARS moving forward.

A World Sailing Measurement Seminar was delivered for the first time in Canada, in October 2019. There were 12 participants from across North and South America. Annual Sail Canada Officials training took place throughout the year, with the Advanced Judge Seminar delivered in the spring of 2019 and a bilingual Advanced Race Management Seminar delivered in the fall.



COMMUNICATIONS

It has been an exciting year for Sail Canada! 2019 saw the creation of many different assets for our members, from a website, to videos, and downloadable resources, Sail Canada is on track for success.

After a long year of work, <u>Sail Canada launched a brand new website</u>! This stylish site is a great success. Focusing on a more photobase site, it is now visually appealing and easy to use. Information is easily accessible from computer, phone, and tablet. There are many opportunities to expand on this site as time goes on, which is a great asset as sites are ever changing.

Working with great videographers, we were able to portray the beauty and excitement of our sport. Launched on all of our online platforms, and promoted outside of our core member group, the video pulled in a lot of traction from Canadians across the country. <u>Click here to view</u>

After a lot of hard work, the team was able to put together six informational skill and drill videos for coaches, instructors, and athletes to use. These will allow for more consistency across the board when coaching athletes. This is a great start to many more videos to come down the line.

Our social media numbers rose exponentially over the year, specifically on Instagram which has pulled in a lot of the younger generation. Through various contests and promotions, we have created a lot of traction with our members, ensuring we keep everyone engaged and excited!

Through various Instagram story takeovers, members of our Canadian Sailing Team & Development Squad have been able to engage our members by showing them "a day in the life". This has allowed our followers to ask questions, follow their lifestyle, while also helping the athletes promote themselves and their own social pages.

SAIL CANADA LOGO

This year saw a lot of positive developments, including the update of the Sail Canada logo. The logo was enhanced to match the current aesthetics being used across other sports. The changes were very minimal. The boat now shows a Canadian Maple Leaf, and we have added to our full name in both official languages to ensure that people can easily recognize our brand. This branding change resulted in a lot of exciting merchandising and branding opportunities.

ORGANIZATIONAL RISKS & MITIGATION STRATEGIES

Sail Canada has developed a Risk Registry to identify, monitor and mitigate potential risk to the organization and the sport. The Risk Registry is updated and monitored on a regular basis by the CEO and Board of Directors, with input from PSA partners.

Financial Risk

Sail Canada is dependent on government funding for approximately 36% of its revenues. This government funding decreased substantially from 2011 to 2017 but remained stable in 2018-19 and 2019-20. Sail Canada received additional funding for special projects in 2019-2020 related to creating a safe sport environment and increasing participation of females both as sailors but also in leadership positions. With the increased government deficits, Sail Canada could face funding cuts in coming years. Decreases in government funding, without alternative sources of revenue will affect the ability of Sail Canada to achieve its strategic objectives.


As a condition of funding Sail Canada is also expected to work on achieving:

- Gender equity and diversity in the sport
- Concussion and return to play protocols
- Creating safe environments, free from harassment and abuse for all participants
- Generate private sector financial support

Sail Canada is also dependent on membership and program registration revenue which represents 21% of overall revenue. Membership revenue is based on individual sailors paying membership fees to local clubs, who in turn pay a fee to their Provincial Sailing Association (PSA) to become a member of their Provincial and National Sailing Association. The PSA pays a portion to Sail Canada. Due to COVID-19 Sail Canada is expecting a decrease in membership in 2020. It has also seen a significant decrease in instructor registration and program participation fees. As a result Sail Canada has had to significantly decrease its expenditure on programs.

Governance Risk

Sail Canada works closely and consults with the Associations Provincial Sailing (PSAs) for the development of national programs and services for member clubs, and also depends on the PSAs to deliver and implement quality programming and service to member clubs. The capacity of PSAs varies across the Country and each has its own Board of Directors, budgets and priorities. Strategic Plans and directions may or may not align with the Sail Canada Strategic direction making it difficult to drive a cohesive national sailing strategy and brand and avoid duplication of effort and expense. Ongoing discussion on how to create a cohesive national sailing strategy for the promotion and development of sailing continues to be a priority for Sail Canada. In 2020 and 2021 Sail Canada is focusing its efforts on working with the Provincial Sailing Associations to create a COVID-19 Recovery Strategy and at the same time focus on a new Strategic Plan for the next 3 to 4 years.



Operational/Program Risk

Sail Canada operates in an environment with significant interactions between adults and minors and across genders. Inappropriate behavior in contravention of laws could expose the organization to financial and reputational risk. Sail Canada along with other sports are embarking on an effort to create a safer sport environment. Sail Canada is also required by the government of Canada to offer ongoing training in Safe Sport. Training sessions for volunteers, staff, coaches and officials will be offered, working with the provincial sailing associations to provide training throughout the organization to coaches, officials and administrators.

Reputational Risk

Sail Canada trains instructors to run its CANSail programs across the country at sailing clubs and sailing schools. Subsequently, Sail Canada relies on its clubs and schools to effect control over the type of program or quality of instruction offered and for the delivery of programs and development of sailors outlined in the Strategic Plan. Sail Canada's lack of direct quality control could also have a lasting impact on the sport's reputation for quality instruction and safe programming. Sail Canada's CANSail program has been recognized by World Sailing as meeting the international standard for sailing training programs. One weakness was a lack of evaluation of clubs running the program. As such, Sail Canada will be implementing a Club Accreditation program which will require Clubs to meet a minimum of safety and instructor certification in order to be recognized as an Accredited Club certified to run Sail Canada programs.

Leadership and Human Capital Risk

Sail Canada depends on volunteers to serve as members of the Board of Directors, on Board committees and on all operations and committees. Sail Canada makes every effort to attract qualified volunteers for these roles in an effort. to build a stronger, self-sustaining organization. A skills matrix is in place for recruiting board members and terms of references including qualifications are in place for advisory committees. Time constraints on volunteer's time limits the available time to devote to Sail Canada efforts.

Sail Canada also operates in a competitive human resource environment and works to attract and retain staff for the organization.

Compliance Risk

Sail Canada complies with numerous provincial, national and international regulations in areas such as workplace health and safety, official languages, and sportsmanship. Failure to understand these requirements and develop plans to implement controls could have reputational and financial impacts on the organization.

OUR 2020-21 STRATEGIC PLAN & INITIATIVES TO SERVE OUR STAKEHOLDERS



OUR FINANCIAL YEAR IN REVIEW

Following concerted efforts from both Sail Canada and the Audit Committee, this year's Audit Opinion on the financial statements is Unqualified.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

As of April 30, 2020, the assets of Sail Canada exceeded its liabilities by \$1,484,560. This is a decrease of \$222,412 from 2018. This surplus is held in capital assets, accumulated surpluses and restricted funds.

Sail Canada ended its 2019 - 2020 fiscal year with a deficit of -\$247,446 (2019 - 248,234).

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION

In April 2019, the Board approved a budget with a \$200,000 deficit specifically to support the Regional Performance Hubs. This deficit was covered by a board-approved transfer of \$200,000 from the Sail Canada Fund to the General Fund.

As of April 30, 2020, the assets of Sail Canada exceeded its liabilities by \$1,484,560. This is a decrease of \$222,412 from 2019. Current assets as of April 30, 2020 were lower by \$390,574 with cash decreased by \$425,266, investments decrease of \$234,908, and an increase in Accounts Receivable of \$276,580, plus a decrease in prepaid expenses of \$34,272. Total liabilities as of April 30, 2020 were \$387,451, down \$208,162 from the previous year. This change is also partially a result of the difference in the timing of payments from funders related to differences in fiscal years resulting in deferred revenue (see note 7 of the Financial Statements). There was an accounts payable of \$260,339 at the end of the fiscal year 2020, an increase of \$179,682 from \$83,625 at the end of the fiscal year 2019. This was also a timing issue largely related to High Performance

STATEMENT OF OPERATIONS - GENERAL FUND

There was a deficiency of revenue over expenses for the year ended April 30, 2020 of \$247,446 recorded in the Financial Statements. The deficit is in line with the expenses approved by the Board of Directors of setting up and running the Regional Performance Hubs up in Halifax, Kingston, Toronto, and Vancouver and other related High-Performance program expenditures in support of the Canadian Sailing Team and Next Gen Athletes. At the suggestion of our external auditors, for the first time the accrued vacation time payable to staff is included as an expense under Salaries and benefits.

Revenues for the year ended April 30, 2019 were \$2,449,028, an increase of \$139,347 (+6%) from the previous period. Sport Canada Core funding was stable at \$696,500, however Sail Canada received \$125,650 of enhanced funding from Sport Canada to carry out special projects such as Safe Sport Training, Concussions, and Female Leadership enhancement. Sport Canada hosting grant was increased by \$25,000 due to Canada hosting two events eligible for funding in 2018. Own the Podium (OTP) funding increased by \$470,000 (+20%) as additional funding leading to the Olympic Games preparation, Membership and registration fees were down by \$49,313 (- 10%) primarily due to lower instructor registrations. Athlete fees were up \$36,687 (+39%) due to increase in training camps offset by corresponding expenses for athlete competition fees. National Championship were down by \$43,576 (- 39%) offset by decrease in Championship expenses (host share of registration fees). In the past year Cork collected the registration fees for one event how in most cases Sail Canada collects the fees and forwards a percentage to the Organizing Committee. There was an increase in merchandise sales of \$44,702 (+ 39%) offset by an increase in Cost of Merchandize and sponsorship was down \$18,252 (- 19%).

Expenses for the year ending April 30, 2020 were \$2,696,474, an increase of \$138,559 (+5%) from the previous period. Increased expenses occurred in the High-Performance area related to the fact that there were two sets of World Championships that occurred, in June and then again in February in the southern hemisphere. Also there were additional shipping cost to gets boats and equipment to Australia, New Zealand and then Japan. Other increased expenditure occurred related to the additional funding from Sport Canada for Safe Sport Policies and training.

Salaries and benefits were virtually unchanged. The increase shown is related to accrued staff vacation previously mentioned. Official Languages (translations) were up by \$10,548 (+ 46%) as Sail Canada needed to translate a number of manuals into French.

Athlete support was higher by \$25,417 (+ 28%) due to increase athlete programs. This was offset by increased in Athlete fees as mentioned previously. High-Performance salaries and benefits were up by \$19,867 (+ 7%) due to the hiring of a Female Development Coach late in the fiscal year (funded by Sport Canada) plus accrued vacation time of high-performance staff. Regional Performance Hubs shows an increase in cost of \$90,000 but in fact the cost were similar to the previous year but the expenses were tracked slightly differently with some expense for the Hubs being tracked under contract coaches. Coaching equipment, repairs and maintenance increased by \$81,366 (+84%). Sail Canada had to buy a new motor for a coach boat that was stolen. This was offset by the insurance claim. Sail Canada also purchased a used coach boat for the new Youth Development Coach with funds from Sport Canada. In addition, there was increased shipping cost due to World Championships in Europe, New Zealand, Australia and Japan. Travel for Coaches was up by \$17,862 (25%) due to the fiscal year in which numerous world championships occurred for the same classes in the same fiscal year due to timing of the events in the Northern and Southern Hemispheres.

Event costs (National Championships) were lower by \$142,424, (- 39%) offset by lower revenues from National Championships. Other event cost for flow through funding was higher by \$22,966 which represent the additional CORK event funded by Sport Canada. Other program and training cost we lower due to less associated cost. Program costs were lower by \$13,382 (+35.9) reflecting our ongoing efforts to improve the training and certification programs of Sail Canada. An MOU has been established and signed to allow Sail Canada officials to be added to the US Sailing SOARS system. A video shot was completed for development of skill and drill video resources. CANSail instructor program was enhanced to provide quality trained instructors for the program.



STATEMENT OF CHANGES IN FUND BALANCE

The General Fund recorded a net loss of \$47,446 for the year. Disbursement of \$200,000 from the Sail Canada Fund was recorded in the Fund Balance. The Sail Canada Fund recorded \$192,959 of investment income this fiscal year compared to \$9,013 the previous fiscal year. Unrealized gains this year were recorded as (\$152,845) this year compared to \$107,835 last year. The Sail Canada Fund currently has a balance of 1,122,293 compared to \$1,293,446 last year.

The other Endowment funds increased in value a small amount. The Financial Assistance Program paid out \$95,206 of expenses this fiscal year, supported by donation revenue this year of \$88,108.

COMPARISON TO 2019-2020 BUDGET

Sail Canada prepares an annual Strategic Plan and Budget. The process starts with consultation with our PSA partners, and Board of Directors at the Leaders Summit in October of each year and is presented to the Board of Directors for approval by the Board of Directors in April at the Semi-Annual Meeting prior to the start of the fiscal year. The organization tracks its operational performance against the approved budget on a monthly basis. Quarterly budget analysis is reviewed by the Finance & Investment Committee and discussed with the Board of Directors.

The deficiency of Revenue over Expenses in the General Fund of \$247,446 was over the approved budget by \$47,446. Vacation accrual which was recorded for the first time in the financial statements account for \$27,000 of that deficit.

When we exclude the \$200,000 from the Sail Canada Fund from the budgeted revenue, other revenues exceeded budget by \$132,716. The bulk of that revenue (\$126,500) came from new Sport Canada funding to address Safe Sport. concussions and female participation in sport. This funding came after the initial budget was approved by the board.

Expenses also exceeded budget by \$180,162. This deficit was made up of the additional expenses for the new Sport Canada funding (\$126,500) and additional expenses in high performance with the additional world championships in the southern hemisphere in the same fiscal year.
