

### **Safe Sport**

Sail Canada Board members, staff, coaches, instructors and officials all pride themselves in providing a safe environment for all athletes and sailing participants. We continue to review our governance, policies and programs to ensure Safe Sport policies and best practices are embedded in all Sail Canada activities.

Safe Sport is about more than a participant's physical safety; it also encompasses psychological safety, social-emotional safety and cultural safety.

Regardless of ability, age, ancestry, athletic potential, citizenship, colour, economic status, ethnic origin, family status, gender expression, gender identity, language, marital status, place of origin, race, religion, sex and sexual orientation, everyone has the right to cultural, physical, psychological, and social-emotional safety.

We continue to work closely with the Office of the Sport Integrity Commissioner (OSIC), the Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada (SDRCC), ITP Sport and our provincial partners to ensure we have third party, transparent processes in place and adhere to Safe Sport best practices.

### Inclusion, Diversity and Equity: Sailing for All

Thanks to funding partners Sport Canada and the Canadian Olympic Committee, Sail Canada created the Sailing for All initiative, which aimed to provide sailing opportunities for participants from underserved or underrepresented communities.

This program was a great success with 15 programs from 6 provinces taking part, delivering programs to over 700 participants. Programs were delivered for youth/adults using Sail Canada CANSail dinghy, Cruising/Keelboat and Para curriculums.

Working with our partners in EDI, Inclusion Incorporated, and with funding from Sport Canada and the Canadian Olympic Committee, Sail Canada developed resources for our members and hosted online webinars covering a range of topics.

### **Culture of Excellence**

Sail Canada is committed to optimizing the culture of our High Performance Program. At Sail Canada, we believe culture forms the foundation upon which our sport thrives. By nurturing a culture of excellence, we not only enhance the well-being of our athletes, but also maximize our collective potential for success.

Sail Canada is engaging in the Culture of Excellence (COE) project to evaluate our current cultural state and develop an action plan in moving toward a more ideal state. In 2023, Sail Canada, with support from Own the Podium, began the Culture of Excellence project, a survey of Sail Canada High Performance athletes, coaches and staff followed by virtual sessions for discussions. The information collected through this process was used to inform the creation of an action and implementation plan to address the areas that were identified as gaps through the data collected in surveys and subsequent discussions.

The COE is a project funded by Own the Podium, however it remains a completely independent process aimed at evaluating and enhancing the high performance culture within Sail Canada. Unlike other reviews and questionnaires, this project takes a holistic approach, focusing on both the people and performance factors which influence the sport culture. These factors include mental and physical health and well-being, autonomy, psychological safety, Safe Sport practices, athlete & international results, leadership, coaching, daily training environments, and performance pathways.

Sail Canada is committed to this project and continues to work on developing and adjusting the action plan to best support athlete wellness and performance.

Sail Canada took advantage of this annual event gathering community members, supporters of Canadian sailing, as well as athletes and alumni of Sail Canada's National Team and Development Squad, to celebrate its Culture of Excellence and hand out some awards, including those for Sail Canada's 2024 Sailor of the Year and for the Gallagher Skippers' Plan Athletes of the Year, as well as the Volunteer of the Year Award and the Gerry Roufs Trophy. A few weeks prior to the start of the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, participants also had the chance to meet and chat with, and celebrate athletes, coaches and support staff from the 2024 Canadian Olympic Sailing Team, helping to build momentum going into the Games.





### **Programs**

### **CANSail Programs**

The CANSail program continues to grow with increased participant numbers on an annual basis. Sail Canada is reinvesting in the program with ongoing work to provide expanded instructor resources and revised CANSail 1-6 checklists for participants. These revisions will strengthen the program and provide more guidance for instructors to enhance the club level delivery of training.

### **Programs**

### **Long-Term Development in Sailing (LTDS)**

Launched in February 2024, Sail Canada's new long term development model responds to evolutions in sailing and sport since the first version was introduced in 2011. The LTDS is an important piece to support Sail Canada's long term vision of being a leading international sailing nation, proud of its world class athletes, lifelong partici-pants and inclusive culture. ### **Learning Facilitator Clinics**

Learning Facilitators are a vital component of the CANSail program, responsible for training and evaluating new and developing CANSail Instructors across the country. One LF Clinic was hosted in the fall of 2023 in Quebec, followed by two LF Clinics in the winter/spring of 2024 in British Columbia and Ontario, through which 20 new LF's were trained.

### **Coaching Para Sailors Module**

Sail Canada's Coaching Para Sailors Module has been updated significantly through 2023-24, thanks to the work of lead volunteer contributors Jenny Davey and Paula Stone. This update is aligned with the Coaching Association of Canada Coaching Para Athletes Module, and is designed to provide training to CANSail Instructors and Volunteers who will be working with Para athletes and program participants. Three pilot deliveries of the module took place in the spring of 2024. Further deliveries will take place in 2025, with a goal of training new Para Module Facilitators to expand the reach of the module.





## **Coach Development**

### **CANSail Foiling Instructor Module**

Thanks to a collaboration between WeCANFoil and Sail Canada, a pilot delivery of a CANSail Foiling Instructor Module was delivered in Montreal in the spring of 2023. The module is designed to provide candidates with basic foiling training to allow them to deliver training to sailors using foiling equipment. Following this pilot, and two additional pilots in Nova Scotia and British Columbia in 2024, the module will be reviewed to ensure we stay up to date with advancements in foiling classes.

### **Development Coach Program**

The Development Coach Program is designed for coaches working with competitive sailing programs with a season of 4 months or longer, to develop their leadership skills, performance planning abilities and technical knowledge as well as setting them up to support their athletes. The program was updated through 2023 and delivered in both British Columbia and Ontario in the spring of 2024, with 19 candidates from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island taking part. Beyond the course, candidates are required to engage in mentorship and shadow coaching opportunities, develop a coaching portfolio and take part in a webinar series and community of practice.

### **Training**

Sail Canada certified officials led training sessions online, in person and for a number of courses the hybrid approach was utilized. This flexibility enhanced opportunities for participants to take part in training sessions including the advanced judge seminars, rules seminars, practice protest sessions, advanced race management training and mark laying.

#### Collaboration

"Building Partnership and Camaraderie" initiative.

Judge Subcommittee member Dale King spearheaded this program with the overwhelming support of the Sail Canada High Performance team and the Canadian judging community. This collaboration supported the national team athletes and coaches in the lead up to the Olympic trials and continued throughout the trials including the 2023 Worlds and 2023 Pan Am Games, and culminated in supporting the 2024 Olympic Team in Marseille. Thank you to everyone involved with this important initiative. This additional support provided athletes and coaches alike with additional confidence entering each protest situation and was appreciated by everyone on the team!

## Cruising

Sail Canada's cruising portfolio continued to refine standards and strive for ongoing international recognition to increase value to our cruising participants. Sail Canada defined the requirements for Yachtmaster Offshore and Coastal recognition and awarded two new recipients in 2024, Normand Corbeil and Scott Watson.

Effort is ongoing to ensure that cruising standards are kept up to date, translated, and relevant for today's cruising market. Additions to standards have included an emphasis on electronics use and safety.

Sail Canada trained new Instructor Evaluators in BC and Ontario to add resources to the growing interest in instructor training and cruising participation.

#### ILCA 6 Pre-Games Training Camp - July 5-13 - ABYC, Toronto, ON

Eleven of the top development athletes in ILCA 6 came together for a training camp with ILCA 6 Olympian Sarah Douglas in Toronto in the weeks leading up to her departure for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. This camp included CSDS athletes and CST alumni who jumped back in the boat for racing during this camp.

#### Marseille Familiarization Camp - June 2024 - Pre-Olympic Games

This Olympic preparation camp saw the entire Olympic team including athletes, coaches and support staff come together for a training camp to prepare for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. This camp provided the opportunity for athletes to familiarize themselves with all things "Olympic" to aid in a seamless arrival for the Games themselves.

#### Marseille Preparation 2023-2024

In 2023 and 2024, the Canadian Sailing Team's top athletes spent a significant amount of time training and racing in Marseille, including attendance at the 2023 Test Event and countless "Coach" regattas and training blocks hosted in the venue, in preparation for the 2024 Paris Olympic Games.





#### Paris 2024 Team

The team was made up of a mix of past Olympians (2) and new Olympians (4). The veteran Olympians became leaders on the team, helping to support a positive performance environment. The coaching staff and support staff was primarily the same as Tokyo 2020, with two additions, that of Alice Sobiesiak (Athletic Therapist, CSIO) and Eric Holden (Meteorologist). The continuity/familiarity of the coaching staff and support staff, actively built over the entire quad, created a strong team environment.

### **Communications**

Sail Canada created momentum toward the Paris 2024 Olympic Games by following the process of qualifying places by country and athletes, including the creation of live content from major world events. Sail Canada also worked with CBC Sports, not only to share content from remote competition venues and highlight our Canadian athletes, but also to webstream the World Sailing Championships.

Coverage included sending out over 70 press releases sharing not only the athletes' stories towards their Olympic journey, but also those from the community, including annual award winners, great performances from young athletes and much more.

All the different participants in Canadian sailing were also at the heart of Sail Canada's coverage, notably through its partnerships with Sailing in Canada and the Canadian sailing podcast, Whitecap. Sail Canada also worked with Whitecap to provide live coverage of the SailGP competition in Halifax.

Sail Canada's social media and weekly e-newsletter continued to grow.
Sail Canada also created the Women in Sailing group, which already has over
230 members.


Sail Canada is currently facing significant financial pressures. The 2023-24 fiscal year was marked by a decrease in government funding, limited success in fundraising and major investments in both Canadian Sailing Team Athletes and domestic training camps with a focus on the Development Squad and Youth development.

Since the onset of the pandemic, Sail Canada has been able to heavily subsidize coaching and training camps. As we move forward, significant focus needs to be placed on financially sustainable operating models for all operating lines in the organization. Sail Canada program fee increases have not matched inflation in recent years and we trail behind other sports in program and membership pricing. Every effort will be made to ensure sailing is accessible to all, however price program adjustments for the 2025 season are likely.








**Revenue and Expense Historical Data** 







2023-24 Fiscal Year Revenue












